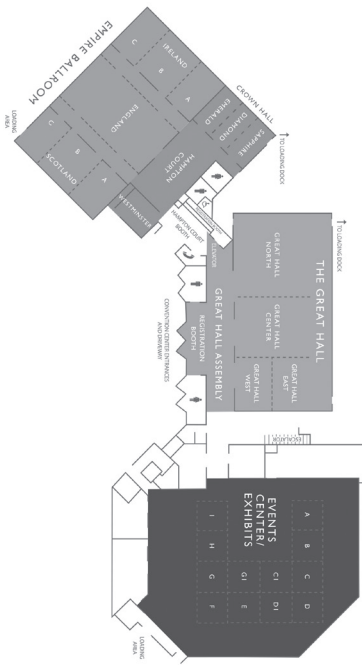
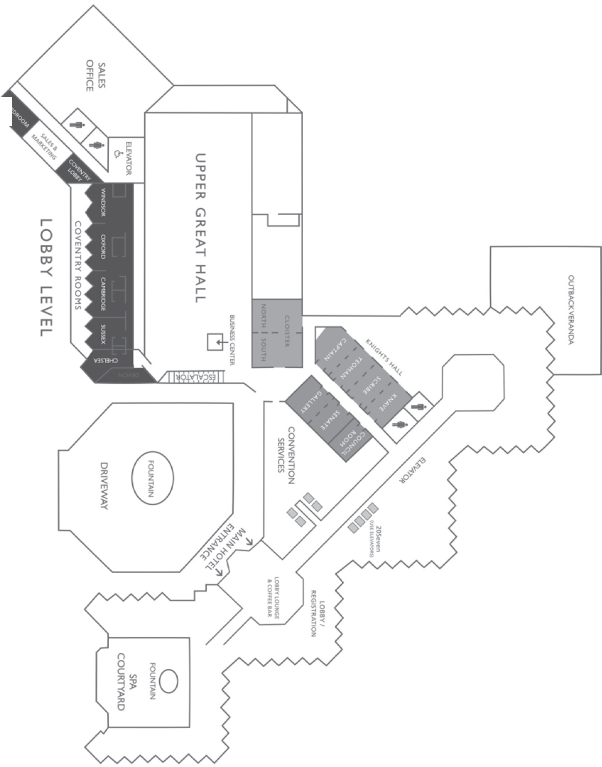

**BROWARD COLLEGE:
CORPORATE ALLIANCE PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM –
CASE STUDY, MEMORIAL HEALTHCARE SYSTEM**

The Corporate Alliance Partnership (CAP) is a program to build comprehensive, mutually beneficial relationships with employers to grow a stronger Broward community. Starting with a simple business relationship between a company and the college, CAP converts that contact into a sustainable partnership that aligns students to employers and builds a workforce pipeline to bridge the skills gap.

This low cost, high reward relationship building tool has revolutionized how the college approaches corporate training, continuing education, career center services, internships and on-site enrollment services. The CAP team captures employer engagement in a web based client relationship manager. This allows the cross-functional team to share interactions with employers, connect to other departments in the college, assign tasks and follow up on actions.

The CAP between Broward College and Memorial Healthcare Systems (MHS) is an example of how deep relationships can support student success and meet employer demand. MHS comprehensive relationship with the college was born from the need for clinical rotations for health science students, but through CAP has evolved to student sponsorships with guaranteed employment, extensive continuing education skilled training for Memorial employees, new program development support, equipment donations, student coaches and dedicated clinicians to build and deliver continuing education programs.

**INDIAN RIVER STATE COLLEGE:
CYBER SECURITY INSTITUTE**

In response to the growing need for cyber security experts, Indian River State College created the Cyber Security Institute to develop a pipeline of certified cyber security graduates, educate interdisciplinary students, and inform local businesses and government organizations about cyber security.

The innovative nature of the Cyber Security Institute revolves around the Knowledge, Skills, Ability training approach to both cyber degree seeking students and students of any discipline.

This approach begins with creation of a guided pathway for each student, launching them on the knowledge component and focus on learning fundamentals in a classroom environment. They then develop skills through embedded labs. Aligned in this guided pathway are several industry-recognized certifications that allow for assessment and completion points. Finally, by embedding upper level capstone projects and internships with a growing number of industry and government partners, students gain real life experience in the field and the abilities component. Partnerships with St. Lucie and Martin County Computer Information and Technology Divisions allow students to gain experience in internships.

Graduates from this program are employed in a variety of local industry and business sectors, including BHI, FP&L, Pratt & Whitney, U.S. Sugar, St. Lucie County Sheriff's Office, and Harris Semiconductor.

**PALM BEACH STATE COLLEGE:
CENTER OF EXCELLENCE IN MEDICAL SIMULATION**

The Center of Excellence in Medical Simulation was established in 1999 through a State of Florida Department of Education matching seed grant to infuse simulation training in career programs. The Center's function is to provide an alternative to clinical assignments for students enrolled in health sciences & public safety programs using the "standardized patient," adult and pediatric human patient simulators, and a birthing and newborn simulator. In 2014, an innovative approach for interprofessional education was introduced in the Center where interdisciplinary teams of students provide healthcare in a variety of simulated settings to include home care, emergency department and intensive care, and step-down telemetry healthcare delivery with special focus on the elderly and veterans with existing medical conditions. To

complement the interprofessional simulations, medical residents from the University Of Miami Miller School Of Medicine have participated in clinical simulation with registered nursing students, thus further supporting the "real world" environment. A recent 2016 addition to the Center of Excellence in Medical Simulation is the remote presence robot by Double Robotics named Dr. R2.

Since 2011, the Center has provided more than 4,613 simulations to 8,561 students in 1,428 classes in programs including registered nursing and other allied health programs.

SOUTH FLORIDA STATE COLLEGE:

SFSC*open*

OPTIMIZING TEXTBOOK AFFORDABILITY VIA OPEN EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES (OER)

South Florida State College has committed to an aggressive strategic initiative, **SFSC***open*, to promote and institutionalize the use of open educational resources (OER). OER are teaching, learning, and research resources that reside in the public domain or have been released under an intellectual property license that permits their free use and re-purposing by others. Studies have shown that students in courses using OER often show higher grades, increased number of courses taken, and reduced drop rates than when in courses with traditional textbooks.

National studies have shown that the average college student spends \$1,200 per year on textbooks. At the state college level, that represents approximately one-third of the total cost of attending college. South Florida State College faculty, in several key areas (psychology, first-year experience, and chemistry), have already adopted OER textbooks in their courses that has resulted in an annual net cost savings to students of \$125,480.

Over the last academic year, through the use of OER textbooks, the Florida College System has saved students more than 1.9 million dollars. Replication of **SFSC***open* by other Florida colleges could help move this from an institution initiative to a statewide initiative and help make the FCS the national leader in making college more affordable and thus support Governor Scott in making Florida the best state in the nation to get a great education.



The Florida College System Activities Association Hall of Fame is comprised of administrators, coaches, advisors, and other nominees that have contributed a minimum of ten years of service to the FCSAA or one of its member institutions. Those being inducted for their contributions as a student have continued to contribute to their field past graduation. They have been selected by their peers on the merits of their community and state college contributions and achievements as well as significant accomplishments.

DR. JOHN ROBERT DUNKLE, JR.

Dr. John Robert Dunkle, Jr., retired in 2011 from his role as Professor of Humanities and assistant Brain Bowl Coach at Chipola College. While at Chipola, he was one of the original advisers for the Chipola College Honors Program and the chair of the Humanities contest for the Throssell Literature/Language Festival. He was a member of the Chipola Faculty Association and a contributor to the Applauding Chipola Theater Fund, Chipola Foundation, Chipola Honors Program, Phi Theta Kappa, and the Chipola Science Club. He was nominated for induction by the Brain Bowl Division.

Dr. Richard F. 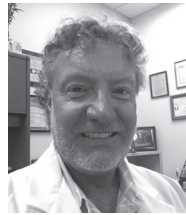
