2.0 Council of Presidents Minutes

2.1 Approval, Council of Presidents Meeting Minutes, April 12, 2018

Action: Upon a motion by Dr. Massey and a second by Dr. Meadows, the minutes of the April 12, 2018 meeting of the Council of Presidents were approved without objection.

3.0 Report of the Chair -Dr. Tom LoBasso, Chair

3.1 Approval, COP Bylaw Amendments

Action: Upon a motion by Dr. Falconetti and a second by Dr. Probstfeld the COP Bylaw Amendments were approved without objection.

3.2 Approval, 2018 Steering Committee Ballot

Ballots for new steering committee members were distributed to all members of the Council of Presidents who were in attendance. After the Council had completed the ballot, they were collected by Michael Brawer and the votes for three new members were counted. Mr. Brawer handed the results to Dr. LoBasso who read them aloud.

Action: Upon a vote by ballot the voted in members of the Steering Committee are Dr. Tonjua Williams, Dr. Angela Garcia-Falconetti, and Dr. Tim Beard.

A ballot for the election of the 2018-19 AFC Policy and Advocacy Committee Chair (COP Vice-chair) was provided. The first ballot resulted in a tie between Drs. Murdaugh and Holdnak. A second ballot was provided to break the tie.

Action: Upon a vote by ballot the 2018-2019 AFC Policy and Advocacy Chair will be Dr. Jim Murdaugh.

3.3 Ratify, AFC and FCSAA Assessments

Mr. Brawer presented the 2018-19 Assessments for each college.

Action: Upon a motion by President Parker and a second by Dr. Faconetti the AFC and FCSAA Assessments were approved without objection.

3.4 Approval, 2018-19 Meeting Schedule

Dr. Henningsen reminded the Council that the health insurance rates will need to be ratified by the Council of Presidents sometime after the Operations Committee meets on August 17. Dr. Henningsen stated that a narrative of the rates for each college could be provided to the Council by email. President Parker suggested having a conference call in either late August or early September to ratify the Employee Benefit Plan. It was agreed that a conference call would be the best option. A date for the call was not decided, but a call will be added for late August.

Action: Upon a motion by Dr. Henningsen and a second by President Haile the 2018-19 Meeting Schedule was approved without objection.

4.0 Report of the Chancellor, The Division of Florida Colleges – Ms. Madeline Pumariega

Chancellor Pumariega referred to the distributed materials that make up the strategic plan of The Division of Florida Colleges. She shared that the 2017-2018 Annual Report is in the works and will be shared upon completion.

Chancellor Pumariega shared that the State Board of Education passed the Civic Literacy Competency. This does include the courses that FCS and University faculty outlined as those that meet Civic Literacy requirements as well as College Level Examination Placement (CLEP) and Advanced Placement courses. This rule does not include the citizenship test, as it does not include Supreme Court cases which the Legislature required in statute.

Chancellor Pumariega shared that Program Evaluation and Review Test (PERT) is no longer an option for end of course for Algebra I and Algebra II. This means that high schools cannot use PERT as an alternative measure to end of course for Algebra. PERT can still be used in dual enrollment requirements.

Chancellor Pumariega reported there is some discussion coming up in regards to Emergency Medical Technician clock hours. The Articulation Coordinating Council was looking at a technical center that is looking at bringing back clock hour not credit hour for their EMT/Paramedic program. She encouraged presidents who have these programs and are interested in the clock hour program to please speak with Dr. Massey, who is on the Articulation Coordinating Council.

Chancellor Pumariega shared that in terms of Performance Funding, all FCS presidents have received a copy of their completion and retention numbers for their institutions. The Division is now waiting for the US Department of Labor to release wages and placement data. As soon as that data is received and final calculations are complete, each college will be contacted on their rating as gold, silver or bronze and how much of the appropriations of the \$30 million will be received by each college.

Chancellor Pumariega shared that the Division is still working on an academic program inventory. She shared that work is aligning sip sok codes to metamajors. The hope is this will help the guided pathways work that is also being done.

The Division is working with the State Higher Education Executive Officers to develop 3-5 common questions that can be used by graduates as an exit survey.

There are three workgroups working under math redesign, one is K-12 group,

second is Florida College System group, and third is FCS/FUS group. These groups will focus on the various math pathways for students.

Chancellor Pumariega also referred to the CAPE Industry Certification dollar amount which was distributed. She shared that the system is in excess of 12,000 industry certifications. One thing that was previously discussed was asking for additional support for industry certifications to get to the 1,000 per student that was the benchmark the legislature established.

6.0 Committee and Task Force Reports/Updates

6.1 Articulation Coordinating Committee – Dr. Ed Massey

Dr. Massey reported that the Committee met on May 23, 2018. He stated that the group discussed the EMT/Paramedic clock versus credit hour as Chancellor Pumariega mentioned earlier. Another item was common prerequisites. He also shared that Florida Virtual School is redesigning the common prerequisite manual.

6.2 Distance Learning Committee – Dr. Stan Sidor and Dr. Jonathan Gueverra

Dr. Sidor reported that the Committee met by conference call on May 8, 2018 and is working through the Four-Point Work plan. Currently the group is working to gather information to report to the COP on student online readiness assessment best practices. The group also met with Cynthia Deluca and Denis Waffle of University of Central Florida, they are leading the Quality Certifications Workgroup at SUS. Dr. Sidor mentioned that there had been some discussion that the FCS would not be able to participate, but that is not the case.

6.3 Florida College System Risk Management Consortium – Dr. Jim Henningsen and Dr. John Holdnak

Dr. Henningsen read through the three action items that were presented.

- **6.3.2** Ratify, 2018 Property/Casualty Optional Program Renewals
- **6.3.3** Ratify, 2017 Employee Benefit Plans Audit

Action: Upon a motion by Dr. Probstfeld and a second by Dr. McGee all three items were ratified unanimously.

6.4 Funding Formula Workgroup –Dr. Carol Probstfeld

6.5 Media and Public Relations Committee – Dr. Tom Leitzel and Dr. Jeff Allbritten

Fern Senra-James reported for the Committee. He shared that from a media perspective, this has been a very successful year. He referred to the distributed June edition of the Florida Trend. The second FCS advertisement is highlighted in this issue.

6.6 FCSAA - Dr. Stan Sidor

Ms. Kelly Warren referred to the 2018-19 FCSAA Proposed Operating Budget, which was in the distributed FCSAA folder.

6.6.1 Approval, 2018-19 FCSAA Proposed Operating Budget

Dr. Holdnak asked why there were no 2017-18 budgets for the Student Government Association as well as softball. Ms. Warren explained that last year FCSAA tried to rebuild reserves. Upon examining carry over accounts for each division it was decided that any division with more than 200% sitting in carry over accounts did not receive an operating budget. So for 2018-19, SGA and softball went back to their normally funded figures. Ms. Warren stated that allowed for an increase in reserves of about \$30,000.

Action: Upon a motion by Dr. Holdnak and a second by Dr. McGee the 2018-19 FCSAA Proposed Operating Budget, was approved unanimously.

Ms. Warren highlighted the success of several FCS teams. Ms. Warren also presented Dr. Probstfeld with a plaque of appreciation for her work with the FCSAA over the past four years.

6.7 Support Council Reports – Dr. Lawrence Barrett 6.7.1 CIA

Dr. Corragio referred to the submitted CIA online report. The next CIA/CSA will be held in October.

6.7.2 CSA

Dr. DeSanctis referred to the distributed CSA report.

6.7.3 COBA

Mr. White referred to the online submitted COBA report. The next scheduled COBA meeting will be September 12-14, 2018,

6.7.4 FCRD

Ms. Skryd referred to the online submitted FCRD report.

7.0 AFC Report

Dr. Coleman-Ferrell reported to the Council that AFC has been busy with advocating and increasing membership. She updated the Council on the recent meetings and conferences hosted by the AFC. Dr. Colman-Ferrell shared information about the upcoming Campus Safety Symposium and BIT Training as well as bringing attention to the AFC Annual Conference flyers that were placed on the tables.

Mr. Brawer shared the locations for the Florida Chamber reception, meeting with Commissioner Putnam, as well as the Annual Banquet.

8.0 Other Business

8.1 Dr. LoBasso announced that there was an opening on the Florida College System Risk Management Consortium Operating Committee Workgroup. There had been one nomination, Dr. John Grosskopf. Dr. Holdnak announced that his term was also expiring, but he is willing to continue on in the current role.

Action: Upon a motion by Dr. Henningsen and a second by Dr. McGee, Dr. Grosskopf and Dr. Holdnak were appointed co-chairs of the FCSRMC Operating Workgroup.

- **8.2** President Parker referred to the COP Bylaws revision that provided for the COP Chair to appoint a Policy and Advocacy Workgroup. President Parker appointed President Pickens as chair of the COP Policy and Advocacy Workgroup. She asked for Dr. Holdnak and Dr. Sidor to work along with President Pickens on the workgroup, in conjunction with herself and Dr. Murdaugh.
- **8.3** Dr. McGee thanked the Council for the years of support and friendship. She announced that upon her retirement, Dr. Georgia Lorenz will take

over as president of Seminole State College on August 1, 2018.

Dr. LoBasso adjourned the meeting of the Council of Presidents at 4:59 p.m.

President Parker called the conference call meeting to order at 3:06 p.m. and thanked everyone who was able to call in. She stated there would be two items discussed during this call. The first would be to address the FCSRMC action item and the second would be to briefly discuss the outline for the October 4-5, Council of Presidents meeting at Palm Beach State College.

President Parker called upon Dr. Holdnak to present the FCSRMC action item. Dr. Holdnak stated that typically each September, the following year's rates are ratified during a September Council of Presidents meeting. He stated that he was convening the Council of Presidents as the Florida College System Risk Management Consortium Council and the only order of business was to discuss the ratification of the rates provided by the Operations Committee. He announced that Chauncey Fagler was on the phone for the Risk Management Consortium and asked him to briefly explain the recommendation.

Mr. Fagler stated that the intent of the call was to ratify the Employee Benefit Plans 2019 Recommendation as it had been submitted. The recommendation had been emailed to all members of the Council prior to the call. Mr. Fagler went through the two sections of the recommendation, the self-insured health program and the fully insured products, by reading through the bullet points.

Dr. Holdnak asked if there were any questions from the Council related to the premium changes. He then stated that the summary had been emailed to everyone from Mr. Brawer, and all the talking points as well as the specific data for each college had been emailed to each college president, business officer, and human resources director within the last 10 days.

Dr. Beard asked if the 7.19% rate change was a positive rate change. Mr. Fagler stated that the Consortium was just below the Market rate which was between 8.5% - 10.5%.

Dr. Barrett stated he recently read where the state of Florida showed an increase overall and it's only going to go up about 5%. He asked if this data was incorrect and was the increase national or for the state of Florida. Mr. Justin Piazza shared that the statement change used by the Consortium is the market average or the Carrier's Book of Business average. Dr. Holdnak confirmed that is a national number.

Dr. Meadows asked how many institutions are now in the Consortium. Mr. Fagler stated that currently there are 22 institutions in the health plan, and in the fully insured products the number varies by college.

Dr. Beard asked if eliminating other pharmacies would allow the rates to go down further, being that eliminating CVS and Target saved one half million dollars. Dr. Holdnak replied that the OperationsCommittee has not yet tasked the Consortium with trying to negotiate for a single vendor. He stated that the primary reason is the state is so diverse and not everybody will have access to all providers. The Operations Committee did review the option of offering only Walgreens or a grocery store chain, but the cost savings was so miniscule that the Committee did not feel comfortable making that recommendation.

Dr. LoBasso asked, in reference to Dr. Barrett's question, why we are 2% higher than the average. Robert Pralle, with the Consortium, stated that Florida Blue, the largest carrier in the plan administrator, is currently using a 10.5% rating trend. He shared that at the Consortium the rating trend was at 7%. Looking at the observation of 5%, not being sure whether that was the State of Florida Employee Group or Marketplace trend, Mr. Pralle shared that often times in the media, when the reporting average increases, those include an adjustment to a reduction in the benefits and often times those numbers can be confused. He shared that Gallagher, current consultant for the Consortium, is showing the average market increase is about one point higher than the 2019 Consortium increase. Dr. Holdnak asked if it was possible that the creators of the article called around and got data from individual policies. Mr. Pralle said that is a possibility, if it was the State of Florida Employee Group, those rates are more politically set than actuarially set. Also, if it was individual policies, those rates are typically are higher than those in the group market.

Dr. Falconetti asked for clarification from Mr. Pralle on the average 10% if the rate is not adjusted for benefits and that is often what the media does. If that is correct, then wouldn't we be below the average? Dr. Holdnak replied that an absolute answer could not be given as the coverage pool used in the article is

unknown. Dr. Holdnak stated that being in the thick of things this year, it appears we are on the low side. Mr. Pralle stated that over the last 10 years, according to several major consulting firms, the average has been 8.80% and at the Consortium during that same time period the average change has been 5.06%. The Consortium has consistently been below the Marketplace in rate changes and the benchmark studies in terms of the benefits have consistently been more favorable than the national, regional, and industry specific on education during that time period. Dr. Falconetti stated that information just shared is helpful and having the same script to share with board members when discussing rate changes is beneficial. Dr. Barrett stated that the rate increases of 5.2% were from the Affordable Care Act. Dr. Holdnak stated that the Affordable Care Act has a very specific level of benefits. Mr. Pralle shared that those plans, in the Affordable Care Act have been experiencing double digit increases, whereas the Consortium has only been experiencing mid-single digit increases.

Action: Upon a motion by Dr. Meadows and a second by Dr. Probstfeld the Employee Benefit Plans 2019 Recommendation was ratified unanimously.

Dr. Holdnak stated that the effective date for this plan is January 1, 2019. The college will begin to collect the increase rate in the December paychecks. Due to open enrollment at the colleges it was important that the Council proceed with ratifying this item in September.

President Parker stated that she would be working with Mr. Brawer on the agenda for the October Council of Presidents meeting at Palm Beach State College. She shared that she would be sending out an email to the presidents that will detail the discussion items for the upcoming meeting and Mr. Brawer will email the meeting agenda. She referred to an email that she had sent as an update to the status of the Constitutional Amendments, in particular Amendment 7. President Parker thanked Chancellor Pumariega and Karen Moore for their efforts in helping put that together. She shared that there is information located on the AFC website that discusses basic information about Amendment 7 as well as information on advocating the amendment. If there is an interest, Karen Moore is available participate in a webinar to provide more detail on the amendment. Those interested should contact Mike Brawer.

President Parker adjourned the conference call at 3:25 p.m.

Council of Instructional Affairs Subcommittee Report for Council of Presidents

The following report contains a summary of recent activities of the Council of Instructional Affairs (CIA).

There was some activity over the summer, specifically a webinar regarding guided pathways.

On August 2, CIA and CSA partnered with the Division of Florida Colleges, Florida Student Success Center and Achieving the Dream to deliver a webinar on the status of guided pathways in the Florida College System. You can find a <u>recording of the webinar</u>, a copy of the <u>presentation</u> and <u>supplemental slides</u> from Achieving the Dream, as well as their <u>environmental scan</u>.

In preparation for the CIA/CSA meeting, the chairs sent surveys to council members to select a sub-committee of interest. The sub-committees are continued from last year and are: Affordability, Articulation, Programs, Retention and Completion, and Innovation. This year, each subcommittee will develop a workplan establishing milestones and deliverables with the intent of making substantive recommendations to the Council of Presidents.

The CIA will meet on October 11-12 at the College of Central Florida in Ocala. There will be a pre-conference workshop on Wednesday:


CSA/CIA – Leadership Workshop

Council on Student Affairs Activities: June 2018 - October 2018

After the presentation at the June 2018 Council of President's meeting regarding the Environmental Scan executed by Achieving the Dream (ATD), the Council on Instructional Affairs (CIA) and Council on Student Affairs (CSA) worked with the Chancellor's office to structure a webinar by ATD that was tailored to the CIA and CSA sub-committees.

On July 5th, a survey was sent to the CSA membership to solicit interest in joining one of the sub-committees and to gauge interest in serving as a co-chair. The purpose of this early solicitation was to ensure that the committee chairs and committee members would be identified and encouraged to attend the ATD webinar to support an early launch of committee work - ahead of the October CIA/CSA meeting.

On August 2nd, ATD presented the overall Environmental Scan and added some slides that were born of their work in mapping the areas of opportunity to the sub-committees: Academic Programs (CIA only), Affordability, Articulation, Innovation, and Retention & Completion.

In addition to mapping to the sub-committees (except for Innovation which encompasses all areas), the areas of opportunity were mapped to the 4 pillars of Pathways and color coded for short-term, mid-term, and long-term implementation. Each subcommittee has been meeting virtually, and is in the process of choosing 2-3 areas of opportunity to inform their short-term to long-term work. The presentation, along with the map, is attached in the email with this report.

The next CIA/OSEC and CSA meeting will be held in Ocala, Florida with all meetings occurring at the College of Central Florida. Special thanks to Dr. Jim Henningsen, and his staff, for graciously hosting us.

This October meeting kicks off with a pre-conference lunch and workshop, sponsored by Blackboard, to support cross-college collaboration through round-table discussions and report outs about: Accountability, Innovation, the Student Experience, Retention of Low Income Students, Finding/Keeping New Students, and Resources/Staffing. Originally designed to be the CSA opportunity to engage in what has traditionally been a day of sessions for CIA/OSEC; the free registration is open to anyone interested, and the traditional agenda has been modified to accommodate CIA/OSEC and CSA (and anyone else that wants to laugh and learn with us). In addition to the Florida College System updates, we are looking forward to learning more about Strategic Scheduling, Closing the 2+2 gap for financial aid students, and having faceto-face time with our sub-committees.

In other news, the CSA Executive Leadership team endorsed the Chief Information Officers Cybersecurity Framework. Dr. DeSanctis, Chair of CSA, provided the letter of support on July 12, 2018.


Findings:




Florida Colleges Making Progress Implementing Pathways at Scale

COBA Report for the 10/5/18 COP Business Meeting

COBA's last meeting was 9/12 – 9/14/2018 and was hosted by Florida Keys Community College (FKCC) with remarks by President Dr. Jonathan Gueverra. Highlights of the major items discussed are as follows:

- A two-hour presentation on FKCC's Active Shooter Emergency Action Plan/exercise by Patricia Thompson, President/Owner of Veritas LLC. A retired FBI agent and current Director of School Safety for the Monroe County Sheriff's Office. It was excellent.
- A PECO update from Lisa Cook, FLDOE.
- A Division Update from Chancellor Madeline Pumariega on the financial outlook for 18/19, a budget overview, and an update on Performance Based-Incentive Funding.
- An update by FCSRMC on changes to insurance rates for the coming year.
- For this COBA meeting we invited the college attorney's for several general roundtable
 discussion on topics of interest, including collective bargaining, music licensing, and the
 legal pros and cons of video cameras (including statutory mandates on how long to
 keep video and under what circumstances).
- The Accounting Committee discussed the following:
 - A presentation by Anita Kovacs, FSCJ on capital leases, bond refunding, and bond debt (new GASB rules are changing the reporting requirements on these items)
 - Unrelated Business Income Tax (UBIT)
 - This is a tax on tax-exempt organizations on income that is substantially unrelated their primary tax-exempt purpose
 - We plan to bring in an expert at our next COBA meeting to discuss this tax and how to ensure we are not liable for it. This will count for professional development credits as well.
- The Controller's Committee discussed the following:
 - Ways to ensure accuracy of student social security numbers prior to issuing 1098T's plus ideas on how to respond to IRS penalty notifications of violations
 - Auditors requesting large amounts of information to be scanned or copied for their review and how to limit the workload involved with those requests.
 - Developing guidelines to limit expenses related to travel, such as ensuring our policies take into account recent developments, such as AirBNB properties, which typically are more expensive than hotels.
 - Significant improvements in the latest version of the Annual Financial Report (AFR), and putting a committee together to continue to refine this report and make it easier to do and more clear.
- The Human Resources Committee discussed the following:
 - Attempts to form adjunct unions at several institutions and how best to deal with unions as a whole
 - Alternatives to the current Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) background check system. FDLE is slowly eliminating each college's ability to run background checks (Daytona State and Lake Sumter have recently lost the capability to run background checks)
- Lastly, we all celebrated the upcoming retirement of Dick Becker after 32 years of service at Palm Beach State College. Dick is a very highly regarded Business Officer and we will miss his expertise greatly.

The FCRD Board of Directors met in person on Thursday, September 13, 2018, on the campus of Daytona State College. This board meeting was held in conjunction with FCRD's fall gathering, professional development conference.

Thank you to Daytona State President Dr. Tom Labosso, Foundation Executive Lorene King, Lisa Koogle and all at DSC for their wonderful hospitality for the two days we were on campus.

During our board meeting we discussed the Following:

- 1. <u>Data Collection</u>- we will again be collecting aggregate data on the success of the Florida College System DSO's, to include:
 - Total fundraising
 - Total revenue
 - Total provided to the college
 - Percentage of fundraising that is restricted/unrestricted
 - Total staffing in the Foundation paid by the College.

- 2.
