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
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
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President's Message

2021 James L. Wattenbarger Award Willie H. "Bill" McCloud



Bill McCloud is co-owner and serves as Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of McCloud Transportation & Associates, LLC, which is a national multimodal transportation consulting firm.

In his former role as Senior Vice-President of Veolia Transportation, Bill was responsible for providing leadership and support to the executive and senior management team both nationally and internationally. Veolia Transportation has over 17,000 employees and operates 150 contracts for cities and transit agencies in

the U.S. and Canada. Bill is known nationally and internationally for his leadership expertise in both the public and private sectors.

Bill also served as Chief Operating Officer for 11 years for ATC and National Express Corporation, which was the largest transit management company in North America. He served as General Manager Operations for Hillsborough Area Regional Transit (HART) in Tampa, Florida.

Bill served in the military for 20 years and retired as a Chief Warrant Officer in the Army Corp of Engineers. He was appointed as the Army's Chief Engineer for Maintenance on power generation, rail, and marine equipment, which is the highest-ranking warrant officer position in the army.

Bill serves on numerous boards. Currently, he is a member and former Chairman of the St. Petersburg College Foundation Board of Directors. He is also a member of the Transportation Research Board (TRB), which is a division of the National Academy of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine. He is a member of the St. Petersburg College Alumni Association Board of Directors, is President of the Gibbs Junior College Alumni Association, and is a member of the Conference of Minority Transportation Officials (COMTO).

He is a former member of the Congressional Black Caucus (CBC) Transportation Braintrust. For 20 years, Bill was an Advisory Board Member at the National Center for Transportation Research at the University of South Florida (USF). He is the former Vice-Chairman of the Tampa Bay Area Regional Transportation Authority's (TBARTA) Citizens' Advisory Committee. Bill has numerous awards including being selected by the American Public Transportation Association (APTA) as Outstanding Business Member and Executive of the Year in 2003. In 2012, he was selected by the National Council for Resource Development as Community College Benefactor for St. Petersburg College. He was selected as Corporate Executive of the Year by the Minority Purchasing Council for the state of Nevada. He was selected by the City of Tampa, Florida, and the Police Athletic League (PAL) as Citizen of the Year.

He has been featured in international publications such as Ebony, Jet, and Black Enterprise magazines and is listed in the National Register of Who's Who of Executives and Professionals, which is archived at the National Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. Bill's educational accomplishments include a doctoral management candidate at Webster University, St. Louis, Missouri. He has a Master of Arts Degree in Management and Business Administration from Webster University, in St. Louis Missouri, and a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Human Resources Management from Pepperdine University in Los Angeles, California. He has a Mechanical Engineering Technology Degree from St. Petersburg College in St. Petersburg, Florida.

Bill resides in Odessa, Florida with his wife, Elaine, and he has four adult sons.

2021 LeRoy Collins Distinguished Alumni Awards

2021 LeRoy Collins Lifetime Achievement Award JUSTICE RICKY POLSTON



Presented to the Florida college alumnus who has reached state, regional or national recognition. The recipient represents the highest level of achievement in his or her field.

Ricky Polston, Florida Supreme Court Justice, is Chipola College's 2021 Alumnus of the Year.

Polston grew up on a farm in the small Panhandle town of Graceville, Florida, where his

family raised peanuts, watermelon, and cattle. He graduated from Chipola in 1975 with an Associate in Arts. He says, "I will always be grateful for the opportunity to attend Chipola and for the excellent foundational education that I received there. The professors took a personal interest in us and genuinely cared. On a personal level, I had great fun meeting new lifelong friends and continuing with others from my hometown. I could not have asked for a better experience in my first two years of college."

Polston has returned to Chipola in recent years to offer advice to students in the college's Honors program.

Polston went on to earn a Bachelor of Science at Florida State University, where he was named FSU's Most Outstanding Accounting Student and was inducted into the Beta Alpha Psi Honorary Accounting Society. Upon graduation, he became a CPA and practiced accounting with Deloitte Haskins & Sells in the Tampa office for seven years. He then returned to FSU for his law degree. Although no longer practicing accounting, he remains a CPA and is a member of the Florida Institute of CPAs and American Institute of CPAs.

In 1986, Polston obtained a Juris Doctor degree with high honors from Florida State University College of Law. He was a member of the FSU Law Review and the Order of the Coif. After becoming a member of the Florida Bar, he worked in private law practice for 14 years primarily in commercial litigation and was a certified circuit court mediator. He received a MartindaleHubbell AV rating and was included in the Bar Register Preeminent Attorneys. He was a member of the Tallahassee Bar Association and Tallahassee Inn of Court (former treasurer). He was admitted to practice before the U.S. District Court, Northern District of Florida; U.S. District Court, Middle District of Florida; U.S. District Court, Southern District of Florida; U.S. Tax Court; U.S. Court of Appeals, Eleventh Circuit; U.S. Court of Federal Claims; U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit and the U.S. Supreme Court.

Polston became a Judge at the Florida First District Court of Appeal in 2001 until becoming a Justice of the Florida Supreme Court in 2008. During this time, he served a two-year term as Chief Justice of the Florida Supreme Court (2012-2014), served as Administrative Justice for many terms, and

has been on numerous Bar and court committees and as a liaison to them. Since 2003, he has been an adjunct professor at the FSU College of Law, teaching various courses including Florida Constitutional Law, Insurance Law, and Alternative **Dispute Resolution.** Polston and his wife, Deborah Ehler Polston, have been married 44 years, have 10 chil-

dren, including an adopted sibling group of six, and numerous grandchildren. He has been involved in his church, including being an elder, deacon, and teacher of various student and adult classes.

2021 LeRoy Collins Distinguished Alumni Awards

2021 LeRoy Collins Against the Odds Award **SABBY HIGHTOWER**

Presented to the Florida college alumna who has achieved despite financial, sociological or physical adversity. Recipients are alumni for whom the college experience has had the most direct and positive effect.

Loving mother, devoted daughter, dedicated student, engaging leader, and enthusiastic volunteer — these are just a few words you could use to describe Indian River State College graduate Sabby Hightower, Master of Health Administration. Those who know her personal story would add survivor, exemplar and champion.

After an undergraduate career filled with personal loss, challenges, and what for others could have been unsurmountable obstacles, Hightower graduated from IRSC in May 2019 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Healthcare Management. Staying focused on her educational goals, she immediately entered the Executive Master of Health Administration, Health/Healthcare Administration Management program at Florida Atlantic University, graduating in 2020. Before embarking on doctoral studies at Saybrook University, Hightower returned to IRSC for a Technical Certificate in Entrepreneurship in the Spring of 2021. She expects to complete a Ph.D. in Mind-Body Medicine: Specialization in Integrative Wellness Coaching in 2025.

Throughout her career at IRSC, Hightower earned many honors. In addition to excelling in her studies — evidenced by securing two gold medals at the statewide Health Occupation Students of America leadership conference — Hightower was highly active in campus life. She served as vice president and parliamentarian of the Campus Coalition Government; served as a board member with the IRSC Collegiate DECA and HOSA chapters; participated in the IRSC Emerging Leaders Program; served as peer mentor and educator in the Women of Color and Legacy Leaders programs; and welcomed prospective students as a student ambassador.

Hightower earned leadership, service and academic awards from Collegiate International DECA and was named CCG Representative of the Year in 2017. Such accomplishment has truly come "against all odds."

Hightower's father passed away in 2016 after suffering a

series of strokes. With four small children to care for, she and her husband began looking after Hightower's mother, a paraplegic with severe health issues. In March 2017,



Hightower's husband went into sudden cardiac arrest and was rushed to the hospital, where he was pronounced dead. After the passing of her husband, Hightower and her children moved into her mother's home. In November 2018, a blaze destroyed that home. Thankfully, the family escaped unharmed.

Hightower credits her IRSC family with helping her stay the course. "With the loss of a couple of loved ones in my family, I needed the community of IRSC to grab hold of my hand to keep me strong and motivated, and for that reason, I was able to prevail," she shares.

Hightower's steadfast commitment to education, leadership and volunteerism continues today. She is chair-elect of the LPC East Florida 2021/American College of Healthcare Executives; Corporate Compliance & FQHC Accreditation Leader for Treasure Coast Community Health; mentor to HOSA members and officers at IRSC; and is a volunteer caregiver concierge at VNA of the Treasure Coast.

Hightower is a role model for her children and her peers alike. Her perseverance embodies the spirit of IRSC students past and present. Her undergraduate career was filled with what could have been unsurmountable obstacles, yet Sabby Hightower persevered and graduated from Indian River State College with a B.S. in Healthcare Management. She lost her father and her husband, and a blaze destroyed her home. Still she excelled at her studies, stayed active in the college community, raised her four young children and cared for her mother.

2021 LeRoy Collins Distinguished Alumni Awards

LeRoy Collins Hometown Hero Award OCALA CITY COUNCILMAN IRE BETHEA SR.

Presented to the Florida college alumnus who has achieved a measure of success within the nominating college's district and has demonstrated notable community involvement. Recipients have expressed a clear, relevant impact of his/her college experience upon their success.

College of Central Florida Alumni Ire J. Bethea Sr. Bethea has served the Ocala/Marion County community for over 30 years.

When many college grads are wanting to leave their hometown to spread their wings, Bethea was encouraged by Hampton Junior College President William H. Jackson

to get right to work in the local community. Hampton Junior College was one of 11 Black community colleges in Florida and merged with Central Florida Junior College (now CF) in 1966. Bethea graduated from CF in 1975.



County Children's Alliance with delivering programming geared at sharing community resources and providing talks about the dangers of substance abuse.

Bethea is chairman of the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Commemorative Commission. As such, he oversees projects like the Martin Luther King Jr. Day in the Park and is a committed leader who is the first to roll up his sleeves to get the work done.

Bethea has received many awards including the Racial Harmony & Cultural Awareness "Unsung Hero Award" in 2011,

In 2020, Bethea received the College of Central Florida Distinguished Alumni award. He is a graduate of

Bethea retired after a combined 30 years of service with the City of Ocala and the Boys and Girls Club of Marion County. He currently represents District 2 on the Ocala City Council. He is a lifelong resident of Ocala and a graduate of Ocala High School, Central Florida Community College and St. Leo University.

A typical day in Bethea's service to the community continues after the work day ends at 5 p.m. He is credited with volunteering for multiple organizations and committees across the area throughout his career and retirement. Many of his volunteer efforts are geared toward helping Marion County's youth.

Since his retirement in 2016, Bethea continues to mentor youth throughout the county. Today, he assists the Marion

Leadership Ocala/Marion Alumni, Class XVII; was inducted into the African American Museum of Marion County in 2015; Past-Polemarch of the Gainesville Alumni Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.; received Man of the Year Award in 2006 from the Alumni Chapter, Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.; and serves as a Deacon at New St. John Missionary Baptist Church.

He has been married to Gloria F. Bethea for 29 years and they have seven children. Ire J. Bethea Sr. represents District 2 on the Ocala City Council and served the City of Ocala and the Boys and Girls Club of Marion County for a combined 30 years before retiring. He is a graduate of Central Florida Community College and St. Leo University. Bethea has volunteered with multiple organizations throughout his career and retirement.





rofessionals working in or associated with the college and university spaces have the dual challenge of both stereotype and expectation. The stereotype that they are 'better' at Diversity related challenges and the expectation that they handle issues in educated and refined ways.

THE STEREOTYPE

For decades colleges and universities have been one of the most easily observable crucibles in the 'American Experiment'. A place where people from across the country and the world with varying skin tones, cultures, languages, religions, and political beliefs live and learn together.

This learning and growing and exploring taking place during a time in their lives when they are both parts curious and perhaps malleable; influential and able to be influenced.

As a result of this being the stereotypical norm, an additional consideration became attached. People outside of higher education began to believe that the professionals and faculty who worked with these students were accustomed to and adept with the diversity the student body represented.

This was unfortunately never 100% correct, at any time, at any institution. The irony is that while the student body was assumed to be diverse in many ways the faculty and professional staff were often not. Instead, the further back in higher education one looks the more of a monoculture it represents. Of course, there have been changes and overall a massive increase in the diversity of the educators in these institutions, however, the student diversity seems to continue to outpace them.

THE EXPECTATION:

With this, as a backdrop, one can see how the massive diversity of the student body and the perceived diversity of the faculty and staff would make for a variety of assumptions regarding the work that has been done on campuses, its impact, and continued success.

Yes, a significant amount of work has been done. There have been massive policy shifts, process enhancements, the hiring of talented people of all backgrounds, and more. However, the stereotype outpaces the actual change. Often organizations outside of higher education are looking towards colleges and universities with the thinking being that they will have the answers because they have been working on culture related issues for quite some time.

Other



organizations have taken a different approach.

Organizations that are making the best progress are taking their lessons, advice, and counsel from the best sources regardless of the industry they represent. These more successful organizations are leading the way by identifying the business case and rising it thru their organizations in meaningful ways. They have moved past doing it because it is the right thing to do, instead they push that Inclusion is good for business.

Over the course of the past several years of talking and challenging leaders to do more, I've seen that there are organizations across the breadth of industries that are doing well. From the food industry to hospitality...from architecture to the health industry, many organizations are stretching themselves to do more.

There is a challenge here for those of us in love with higher education. Indeed, there was a time when we were the clear leaders in pushing an inclusivity agenda.

Has this changed?

How can we take the mantle of leadership in this space or should we?

There is much work to be done to develop the next cadre of inclusive leaders and higher education is where many of them will start their journeys.

We have an obligation to do all we can to prepare them well.

And if we do what we are capable of we can continue to be the change we want to see in the world.

The \$1 million Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence, awarded every two years, is the nation's signature recognition for America's community colleges—as President Obama called it, "basically the Oscars for great community colleges." The Aspen Prize honors colleges with outstanding achievement in five critical areas: teaching and learning, certificate and degree completion, transfer and bachelor's attainment, workforce success, and equity for students of color and students from low-income backgrounds.

By focusing on student success and lifting up models that work, the Aspen Prize aims to celebrate excellence, advance a focus on equitable student success, and stimulate replication of effective culture and practice.

The 150 community colleges that are eligible to apply for the 2023 Aspen Prize have been announced. Congratulations to the colleges in the Great 28 that are eligible to apply for the Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence Award.

Legislative Update

On December 3, 2021, the Florida Legislature concluded its last committee week before Legislative Session begins on January 11, 2021. Much of the committee weeks have been focused on state and federal redistricting, which is a process of adjusting state House and Senate district maps after the national census data becomes available, which happens every ten years. Florida picked up one additional congressional district as well, which is the Florida legislature's duty to draw that new district. Importantly, every member of the Legislature, the Governor, and all Cabinet positions will be up for election in November 2022.

As far as the bills that affect Florida College System institutions, the Legislative Committee is tracking many bills that could potentially affect the Floria College System Institutions. HB 45, which would waiver any remaining uncovered tuition

and fees for disabled veterans, passed its first committee stop on December 1, 2021. SB 622 which would create the Institute for Charter School Innovation at Miami-Dade College passed its first committee stop on November 30, 2021. Additionally, two bills that protect certain information and technology plans from public records requests passed the first of its two committee stops.

We look forward to providing you with regular updates regarding the Legislative Session.

Lake Mary, Altamonte, and Oviedo campuses with the assistance of volunteers from the League of Women




Voters. Students and employees were provided the opportunity to register to vote and get information about the Association of Florida Colleges.
