


Focus on Student Success

Challenges

- Many state college students are underprepared for college-level writing
- SB 1720 exempts the majority of students from developmental reading and writing courses
- In Fall 2013, only 67.8% of students in PBSC's Boca Campus ENC1101 courses and 70.9% in ENC 1102 courses earned a passing grade.
- Students were passing ENC 1101 and 1102 without effective writing skills.

Solution

A unified curriculum would set consistent standards for instruction, learning and student success in College Composition I and II

ENC 1101:

Basic writing & argument

ENC 1102:

Builds on ENC 1101 skills Adds research in future college courses and careers

Pedagogy

Composition pedagogy supports a consistent curriculum

- Writing as a process
- Scaffolded assignments
- Practical relavance of formal writing skills
- Revision
- Clear, progressive relationship between Composition I and II

Approach

A group of full-time faculty volunteered to:

- Develop a curriculum using the same textbook, consistent assignments, and grading rubric
- Design the curriculum to be implemented in face-to-face, hybrid, and online environments
- Train faculty before implementation
- Create a Blackboard Organization site to organize and update curriculum materials
- Collaborate with Student Learning Center

Participation

Currently, 10 full-time faculty members participate in the ENC 1101 curriculum; 9 participate in ENC 1102 as well. All 13 of our adjuncts participate in both curricula.

ENC 1101 Curriculum (Fall 2015 - present)

Writing Assignments (80%)

- Assignment 1: Analytical Summary (15%)
- Assignment 2: Responding to a Text (25%)
- Assignment 3: Making an Argument (40%)

All major writing assignments involve at least one major revision.

All assignments are graded using a common rubric.

In-Class/Online Assignments (20%)

- In-class writing, group projects/work, or online discussions
- Instructors determine the nature and scope

ENC 1102 Curriculum (Fall 2017 - present)

Writing Assignments (80%)

- Writing Assignment 1: Making an Argument Using Sources
- Writing Assignment 2: Topic Proposal
- Writing Assignment 3: Outline & Annotated Bibliography
- Writing Assignment 4: Research Paper Draft
- Writing Assignment 5: Final Research Paper

All assignments are graded using a common rubric.

In-class/Online work (20%)

- Writing, group projects, online discussions
- Instructors determine the nature and scope

Curriculum Training

All adjuncts and participating fulltime faculty attend

- Review assignments
- Examine and discuss rubric
- Grade-norming
- Exchange ideas

Adjuncts are paid for 3-hour training




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
