

Consistency in Composition: Focus on Student Success

Explore the benefits of a consistent Composition curriculum and its contribution to student success. In 2015 a group of Palm Beach State College faculty volunteered to develop and pilot the Boca Raton Campus College Composition I Unified Curriculum. This unified approach sets more consistent standards for instruction and learning in College Composition I than previous models where the only common aspects of the course were the course description and learning outcomes. Participating faculty use the same textbook, consistent assignments, the same grading rubric and best pedagogical practices resulting in improved success rates. The course design is sustainable and can be easily implemented in any Composition I or Composition II class. The pedagogy behind the curriculum as well as the success to date will be shared.

Collaborative Learning: The Challenges and Rewards of Making the Transition

Dan Ray, Lead for Faculty Development, WestEd

Transitioning from lecture to active, collaborative instruction can be demanding. This session will focus on first-hand experience implementing collaborative

The Ernest L. Boyer International Award for Excellence in Teaching, Learning, and Technology is named in honor of the late Ernest L. Boyer, former Chancellor of the State University of New York and United States Commissioner of Education. One of the world's leading educators and visionaries, he came to the presidency of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching in 1979 and served in this role with great distinction until his death in 1995. He was named Educator of the Year by News and World Report in 1990, and in 1994, he was awarded the Charles Frankel Prize in the Humanities, a presidential citation.

The award honors the world's most highly creative men and women who have contributed significantly to teaching, learning, and technology in higher education. Each institution of higher education may nominate one faculty member for the award, based on institution-wide searches. The persons nominated for the Boyer Award must have made contributions with broad, significantly positive effects on student learning, motivation, and creativity beyond their own departments and institutions. The award was first presented at the 8th International Conference on College Teaching and Learning in 1997.
