Q1 When you think of Tallahassee Community College, what comes to mind? Check all that apply.







Q4 Do you know how many job-training and career-enhancement programs Tallahassee Community College offers?







Starting a career in firefighting was not a profession Gage Timmons thought was unattainable. In fact, his father was the person who guided him to protect and serve.

"My dad just recently retired after 30 years of firefighting," Timmons said. "I always wanted to follow in his footsteps and do what he did since I was a kid."

Tallahassee Community College seemed to be an obvious choice for Timmons after completing his

associate's degree at the College and later transferring to a university to earn his bachelor's degree. "I went back to TCC," Timmons said. "It's close to home and I enjoyed it and all the instructors."

Timmons said hands down TCC's fire academy is the best program in the state for people to attend. "If they want to get any job in North Florida it's by far the best fire college to go too," Timmons said. "Even people from South Florida come up here to go through TCC then they go back down south. It's just a really competitive and great program to go through."

With an average pass rate of 90 percent on the State exam, the Tallahasses Fire Academy is one of the top academies in the state of Florida. TCC's Firefighter Certificate Program holds two classes a year-one in January and one in July. The Program teaches basic firefighting skills — such as climbing ladders, pulling hose, working with rope, extricating victims from wrecked vehicles, fighting fire and maintaining oculoment.

He encourages students coming out of high school who are unsure about their future to consider errolling in the HVAC program. "It's a very lucrative field," said Bentz. "You can get in and out within a year and a half and it really puts you ahead of the game."

Projected employment for HVACR technicians is expected to increase 15 percent by 2026, reports the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

"With all the skills you learn from [HVAC], you can pretty much work on every piece of equipment," said Bentz. "You can get a job anywhere."
