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
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PRESIDENT'S WELCOME



2021 James L. Wattenbarger Award Winner **Bill McCloud**



Bill McCloud is co-owner and serves as Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of McCloud Transportation & Associates, LLC, which is a national multimodal transportation consulting firm.

In his former role as Senior Vice-President of Veolia Transportation, Bill was responsible for providing leadership and support to the

executive and senior management team both nationally and internationally. Veolia Transportation has over 17,000 employees and operates 150 contracts for cities and transit agencies in the U.S. and Canada. Bill is known nationally and internationally for his leadership expertise in both the public and private sectors.

Bill also served as Chief Operating Officer for 11 years for ATC and National Express Corporation, which was the largest transit management company in North America. He served as General Manager Operations for Hillsborough Area Regional Transit (HART) in Tampa, Florida.

Bill served in the military for 20 years and retired as a Chief Warrant Officer in the Army Corp of Engineers. He was appointed as the Army's Chief Engineer for Maintenance on power generation, rail, and marine equipment, which is the highest-ranking warrant officer position in the army.

Bill serves on numerous boards. Currently, he is a member and former Chairman of the St. Petersburg College Foundation Board of Directors. He is also a member of the Transportation Research Board (TRB), which is a division of the National Academy of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine. He is a member of the St. Petersburg College Alumni Association Board of Directors, is President of the Gibbs Junior College Alumni Association, and is a member of the Conference of Minority Transportation Officials (COMTO).

He is a former member of the Congressional Black Caucus (CBC) Transportation Braintrust. For 20 years, Bill was an Advisory Board Member at the National Center for Transportation Research at the University of South Florida (USF). He is the former Vice-Chairman of the Tampa Bay Area Regional Transportation Authority's (TBARTA) Citizens' Advisory Committee.

Bill has numerous awards including being selected by the American Public Transportation Association (APTA) as Outstanding Business Member and Executive of the Year in 2003. In 2012, he was selected by the National Council for Resource Development as Community College Benefactor for St. Petersburg College. He was selected as Corporate Executive of the Year by the Minority Purchasing Council for the state of Nevada. He was selected by the City of Tampa, Florida, and the Police Athletic League (PAL) as Citizen of the Year.

He has been featured in international publications such as Ebony, Jet, and Black Enterprise magazines and is listed in the National Register of Who's Who of Executives and Professionals, which is archived at the National Library of Congress in Washington, D.C.

Bill's educational accomplishments include a doctoral management candidate at Webster University, St. Louis, Missouri. He has a Master of Arts Degree in Management and Business Administration from Webster University, in St. Louis Missouri, and a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Human Resources Management from Pepperdine University in Los Angeles, California. He has a Mechanical Engineering Technology Degree from St. Petersburg College in St. Petersburg, Florida.

Bill resides in Odessa, Florida with his wife, Elaine, and he has four adult sons.

2021 LEROY COLLINS DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARDS

2021 LeRoy Collins Lifetime Achievement Award

JUSTICE RICKY POLSTON



Presented to the Florida college alumnus who has reached state, regional or national recognition. The recipient represents the highest level of achievement in his or her field.

Ricky Polston, Florida Supreme Court Justice, is Chipola College's 2021 Alumnus of the Year.

Polston grew up on a farm in the small Panhandle town of Graceville, Florida, where his family raised peanuts, watermelon, and cattle. He graduated from Chipola in 1975 with an Associate in Arts. He says, "I will always be grateful for the opportunity to attend Chipola and for the excellent foundational education that I received there. The professors took a personal interest in us and genuinely cared. On a personal level, I had great fun meeting new lifelong friends and continuing with others from my hometown. I could not have asked for a better experience in my first two years of college."

Polston has returned to Chipola in recent years to offer advice to students in the college's Honors program. Polston went on to earn a Bachelor of Science at Florida State University, where he was named FSU's Most Outstanding Accounting Student and was inducted into the Beta Alpha Psi Honorary Accounting Society. Upon graduation, he became a CPA and practiced accounting with Deloitte Haskins & Sells in the Tampa office for seven years. He then returned to FSU for his law degree. Although no longer practicing accounting, he remains a

CPA and is a member of the Florida Institute of CPAs and American Institute of CPAs.

In 1986, Polston obtained a Juris Doctor degree with high honors from Florida State University College of Law. He was a member of the FSU Law Review and the Order of the Coif. After becoming a member of the Florida Bar, he worked in private law practice for 14 years primarily in commercial litigation and was a certified circuit court mediator. He received a Martindale-Hubbell AV rating and was included in the Bar Register Preeminent Attorneys. He was a member of the Tallahassee Bar Association and Tallahassee Inn of Court (former treasurer). He was admitted to practice before the U.S. District Court, Northern District of Florida; U.S. District Court, Middle District of Florida; U.S. District Court, Southern District of Florida; U.S. Tax Court; U.S. Court of Appeals, Eleventh Circuit; U.S. Court of Federal Claims; U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit and the U.S. Supreme Court.

Polston became a Judge at the Florida First District Court of Appeal in 2001 until becoming a Justice of the Florida Supreme Court in 2008. During this time, he served a two-year term as Chief Justice of the Florida Supreme Court (2012-2014), served as Administrative Justice for many terms, and has been on numerous Bar and court committees and as a liaison to them. Since 2003, he has been an adjunct professor at the FSU College of Law, teaching various courses including Florida Constitutional Law, Insurance Law, and Alternative Dispute Resolution. Polston and his wife, Deborah Ehler Polston, have been married 44 years, have 10 children, including an adopted sibling group of six, and numerous grandchildren. He has been involved in his church, including being an elder, deacon, and teacher of various student and adult classes.

2021 LEROY COLLINS DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARDS

2021 LeRoy Collins Against the Odds Award

SABBY HIGHTOWER

Presented to the Florida college alumna who has achieved despite financial, sociological, or physical adversity. Recipients are alumni for whom the college experience has had the most direct and positive effect.

Loving mother, devoted daughter, dedicated student, engaging leader, and enthusiastic volunteer — these are just a few words you could use to describe Indian River State College graduate Sabby Hightower, Master of Health Administration. Those who know her personal story would add survivor, exemplar, and champion.

After an undergraduate career filled with personal loss, challenges, and what for others could have been unsurmountable obstacles, Hightower graduated from IRSC in May 2019 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Healthcare Management. Staying focused on her educational goals, she immediately entered the Executive Master of Health Administration, Health/ Healthcare Administration Management program at Florida Atlantic University, graduating in 2020. Before embarking on doctoral studies at Saybrook University, Hightower returned to IRSC for a Technical Certificate in Entrepreneurship in the Spring of 2021. She expects to complete a Ph.D. in Mind-Body Medicine: Specialization in Integrative Wellness Coaching in 2025.

Throughout her career at IRSC, Hightower earned many honors. In addition to excelling in her studies — evidenced by securing two gold medals at the statewide Health Occupation Students of America leadership conference — Hightower was highly active in campus life. She served as vice president and parliamentarian of the Campus Coalition Government; served as a board member with the IRSC Collegiate DECA and HOSA chapters; participated in the IRSC Emerging Leaders Program; served as peer mentor and educator in the Women of Color and Legacy Leaders programs; and welcomed prospective students as a student ambassador.

Hightower earned leadership, service, and academic awards from Collegiate International DECA and was named CCG Representative of the Year in 2017. Such accomplishment has truly come "against all odds."



Hightower's father passed away in 2016 after suffering a series of strokes. With four small children to care for, she and her husband began looking after Hightower's mother, a paraplegic with severe health issues. In March 2017, Hightower's husband went into sudden cardiac arrest and was rushed to the hospital, where he was pronounced dead. After the passing of her husband, Hightower and her children moved into her mother's home. In November 2018, a blaze destroyed that home. Thankfully, the family escaped unharmed.

Hightower credits her IRSC family with helping her stay the course. "With the loss of a couple of loved ones in my family, I needed the community of IRSC to grab hold of my hand to keep me strong and motivated, and for that reason, I was able to prevail," she shares.

Hightower's steadfast commitment to education, leadership and volunteerism continues today. She is chair-elect of the LPC East Florida 2021/American College of Healthcare Executives; Corporate Compliance & FQHC Accreditation Leader for Treasure Coast Community Health; mentor to HOSA members and officers at IRSC; and is a volunteer caregiver concierge at VNA of the Treasure Coast.

Hightower is a role model for her children and her peers alike. Her perseverance embodies the spirit of IRSC students past and present. Her undergraduate career was filled with what could have been unsurmountable obstacles, yet Sabby Hightower persevered and graduated from Indian River State College with a B.S. in Healthcare Management. She lost her father and her husband, and a blaze destroyed her home. Still, she excelled at her studies, stayed active in the college community, raised her four young children, and cared for her mother.

2021 LEROY COLLINS DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARDS

LeRoy Collins Hometown Hero Award

OCALA CITY COUNCILMAN IRE BETHEA SR.

Presented to the Florida college alumnus who has achieved a measure of success within the nominating college's district and has demonstrated notable community involvement. Recipients have expressed a clear, relevant impact of his/her college experience upon their success.

College of Central Florida Alumni Ire J. Bethea Sr. Bethea has served the Ocala/Marion County community for over 30 years. When many college grads are wanting to leave their hometown to spread their wings, Bethea was encouraged by Hampton Junior College President William H. Jackson to get right to work in the local community. Hampton Junior College was one of 11 Black community colleges in Florida and merged with Central Florida Junior College (now CF) in 1966. Bethea graduated from CF in 1975.

Bethea retired after a combined 30 years of service with the City of Ocala and the Boys and Girls Club of Marion County. He currently represents District 2 on the Ocala City Council. He is a lifelong resident of Ocala and a graduate of Ocala High School, Central Florida Community College and St. Leo University.

A typical day in Bethea's service to the community continues after the work day ends at 5 p.m. He is credited with volunteering for multiple organizations and committees across the area throughout his career and retirement. Many of his volunteer efforts are geared toward helping Marion County's youth.

Since his retirement in 2016, Bethea continues to mentor youth throughout the county. Today, he assists the Marion County Children's Alliance with delivering programming geared at sharing community resources and providing talks about the dangers of substance abuse.

Bethea is chairman of the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Commemorative Commission. As such, he oversees projects like the Martin Luther King Jr. Day in the Park and is a committed leader who is the first to roll up his sleeves to get the work done.

Bethea has received many awards including the Racial Harmony & Cultural Awareness "Unsung Hero Award" in 2011, the NAACP's "Service and Uplift to the Community Award" in 2015 and the Rotary "Service Above Self Award" in 2019.

In 2020, Bethea received the College of Central Florida Distinguished Alumni award. He is a graduate of Leadership Ocala/Marion Alumni, Class XVII; was inducted into the African American Museum of Marion County in 2015; Past-Polemarch of the Gainesville Alumni Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.; received Man of the Year Award in 2006 from the Alumni Chapter, Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc.; and serves as a Deacon

at New St. John Missionary Baptist Church.

He has been married to Gloria F. Bethea for 29 years and they have seven children. Ire J. Bethea Sr. represents District 2 on the Ocala City Council and served the City of Ocala and the Boys and Girls Club of Marion County for a combined 30 years before retiring. He is a graduate of Central Florida Community College and St. Leo University. Bethea has volunteered with multiple organizations throughout his career and retirement.





In 2018, the Florida College System launched the Florida Student Success Center (center) in partnership with Jobs for the Future, Helios Education Foundation, and the Florida College System Foundation. Technology Commission Exemplary Practice: Learning Commons Pop-Up Video Initiative

The staff of the Learning Commons at Tallahassee Community College (TCC) formulated the "Pop-Up Video" initiative to launch in the spring semester of 2021. The pop-up video itself is a throwback to VH1's music pop-up videos from the 1990s in which little blurbs about the artist or song would appear. While incorporating cutting-edge platforms such as VidGrid and Canva, the Learning Commons staff have produced short videos that mimic VH1's engaging and nostalgic shorts. The content of these videos obviously diverges from that of VH1, and ranges from top skills for MAC1105 classes, to succeed in online courses and the Spanish imperfect vs. preterit tenses. However, the form of these resources weaves a classic pop culture artifact with important course content and academic success tips for our students at TCC. These videos are short and sweet, intended to grab students' attention, and quickly convey the information they need to be successful in their classes.

The Humanities Edge Undergraduate Research Program (HEURP) at Miami Dade College is the result of a collaboration between Learning Resources and the Humanities Edge, which provides undergraduate students the opportunity to complete independent student-led research under the guidance of a faculty mentor and a librarian. Students apply for this competitive program with their faculty mentors and upon selection, the research teams are paired with a librarian and embark on the 10-week research journey together. In this intensive program, students select a research topic, complete the research process, and create a project based on the findings of their research. These projects could include academic papers, dance performances, original art, digital portfolios, or any other form of creative expression. Students meet with their faculty mentors every week and are supported on their research journey by their assigned librarians. In addition to the research process and final projects, students must present their research at the Humanities Edge Undergraduate Research Symposium.



Since 2019, Broward College has provided 3 training academy cohort opportunities to members of its Campus Safety department. These academies have improved the professional development of team members, community relationships on and off-campus, and the service delivery and competence of officers.

The academies host 6-11 members during each cycle. Initially, the course length was 24 days, over 8 weeks. Now the course of instruction is 27 days over 9 weeks.

Officers are issued special uniform shirts and temporarily placed under the command of the training coordinator. The training engages the officers physically and mentally. The instruction provides them a core foundation and indoctrination into officer expectations and advanced knowledge. Educational progress is assessed through quizzes, "testing out", (in the case of defensive tactics), and a final examination. The academy concludes with a graduation ceremony before officers are returned to their regular duty shifts and locations.

Remote teaching/learning: a positive outcome from Pandemic and **Futuristic**

Remote teaching/learning when done synchronously (real-time) can be engaging, productive, meaningful, and successful under any circumstance, especially during a pandemic crisis. Some of the impactful practices for the success in the remote environment include, but are not limited to 1) connecting with students way before the term begins with a welcome message, how to login and use remote website, links to class resources, and tips on how to succeed in a class with high rigor and content, 2) make the online course page complete with all the students need in one place, 3) organization of tabs in best functional order in course page, 4) emphasize the practical relevance for being there with the professor during class hours, either synchronous or asynchronous format, 5) get to know the students one-on-one as much as possible within the first two weeks, even though challenging, 6) focus on the learning outcomes and ask probing questions during the lesson, 7) encourage student participation being jovial and through appreciation

and encouragement, 8) being flexible to allow maximum possible time for students to complete assignments and assessments including a weekend for those who work or extremely busy with children being home, etc. 9) review assessments as soon as possible after they submit, and 10) be aware of technical glitches that can happen on both sides and give the benefit of doubt besides requesting documentation.

Also, the use of interactive and cost-free custom E-Books created in 2013 to increase textbook/college affordability is now extremely helpful for remote teaching/learning. The E-Books were developed for three of the lab courses Anatomy Physiology 2 Lab. The E-book allows virtual reality experience when used on student devices through images of actual specimens, models, videos, and self-assessments. It also keeps the students more engaged than a conventional printed lab manual. The E-Books have been widely and effectively used by many students beyond my classes, adjunct faculty, and tutors in PBSC SLCs. Besides annual cost savings, these E-Books have become so invaluable during the recent remote learning environment. Timeliness and usefulness of the Lab E-Book during this remote environment with virtual images of actual specimens and models, videos, and labeling added much more value to bring virtual reality (almost F2F experience) to students. Especially for a lab class, the lab E-Book came in handy as if it was planned with a vision for a remote environment. The E-Book has been shared with the division and used by the Student Learning Center for tutoring. Besides the E-Book, other virtual reality aids used to engage students/learners will be discussed.

Transforming the Culture: Addressing Issues of Equity in Faculty **Professional Development**

Dr. Nika Hogan(Speaker)Pasadena City College and the California Community Colleges Success Network (3CSN), Associate Professor of English



Faculty-student interaction has been identified as the most significant factor in fostering student success, especially so for students who have been historically marginalized and underrepresented in the STEM fields in particular, and in colleges/ universities more generally. In the classroom setting, research highlights the importance of culturally responsive, studentcentered instruction on student success. And yet many, possibly most, STEM faculty members have no formal education in, or experience with, culturally responsive, student-centered teaching.

This workshop will share an approach to building equity literacy by first focusing on STEM disciplinary literacy. In a community of practice bridging the California Community College and the California State University systems, biology, chemistry, physics, engineering, and math faculty are using a powerful framework for teaching and learning—the Reading Apprenticeship framework— to disrupt the status quo and accelerate the pace at which STEM faculty adopt culturally relevant and high-intensity active learning techniques. This workshop allows participants to experience some professional learning activities that support faculty as they learn to design and facilitate text-based, inquiry-based, active, and culturally responsive lessons driven by the metacognitive conversation that can be offered in any teaching modality. It will also share the design of the intensive, online, 10-month professional learning courses that are the cornerstone of the community of practice; tour the growing repository of text-based STEM learning activities; and demonstrate how learning community participants are empowered to work as change agents in their departments, on their campuses, and beyond.

Edquity presents College In a Pandemic: Cash Assistance as a **Pathway to Student Success**

The COVID-19 pandemic has taken a massive toll on people throughout the country and has had a clear impact on the ability of students to pursue education at the nation's Community Colleges. 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

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


