From the Executive Director

A story I often reflect upon is one from when I was a young professional working as a lowly program specialist at the Department of Education in 1992. I was minding my own business in my little cubicle, doing my job. At that time I was coordinating the implementation of the Vocational Gold Seal Scholarship program, which was only in its third year and was still years from being integrated with Bright Futures. My bureau chief at the time came to me about taking the reins of a new federal program called Tech Prep which was funded from Perkins vocational money. She said the job would require the planning and delivery of significant amounts of professional development statewide to program implementers. We had to break down all the programmatic areas that we needed to cover as per the federal regulation via conference training. This included curriculum issues as well as financial and evaluation requirements. Once we did that we realized the breadth and depth of our constituency and that a one size fits all approach would not work.

How do you plan a statewide professional development event with multiple constituencies participating and have something to offer every potential attendee? Every year subsequent to that first one in 1992 we planned an annual event focused entirely on developing the professional skills of those individuals involved with implementing Tech Prep programs across the state. The first conference drew a few hundred people. Five years later we were serving over 2,000 attendees and had to rent a quarter of the Orange County Convention Center to handle it. And we had something for everybody. This is not significantly different in context from the AFC Convention. We realize that one size does not fit all in AFC. We have 18 commissions with different wants and needs for their members. Our job is to cajole that professional development content out of you members, and provide the forum for you to deliver it.

After my first convention with the then FACC in 2008, I wrote a piece in Current and addressed the following principles to guide our future conventions:

- Focusing professional development on core problems of teaching and learning, and college
 management. Instructors, career professionals, and administrators need more opportunities
 to become intellectually engaged with their subject-matter and to deepen their understandings of key concepts. They need opportunities to try new approaches in environments that
 are supportive.
- Balancing individual and organization interests in professional development, and restructuring incentives so that they are more closely aligned. Professional development arrangements should support college-wide improvement, stimulate individual growth and engagement in teaching, and support career advancement of all professionals.
- Embedding more professional development in the workplace so it is more closely related to
 work experience. All college employees should have access to their colleagues and be encouraged to share, discuss, and reflect on their practice.
- Improving the productivity of professional development. We cannot afford the laissez-faire, inefficient approach that has been taken to professional development. We need systemic standards for maintaining levels of participation in professional development activities, and commitment to ensure that college funds are targeted and well-used.

As I reflect back now almost three years, I think we are succeeding. This year, you will be able to experience over 45 concurrent educational sessions, most hosted by a Commission, but open to any attendee. We will also be rolling out our new Certified College Professional program, the center-piece for on-going professional development we plan to offer beginning in 2012. In this era of accountability, it is vital we focus on standards that assure the powers-that-be and the public that their investment in our college system is a good one that reaps positive return on investment.

And without you, our dedicated members, none of this is possible. It is from your ranks that these ideas evolve, and it is our job as stewards of your 'club" to make them happen.







Academic Success Centers for Developmental Mathematics Florida State College at Jacksonville

The Florida State College at Jacksonville Academic Success Centers for Developmental Mathematics enhances student success and persistence in developmental education courses. Each fall, approximately 70% of new students who enroll in FSCJ require remediation in one or more developmental courses. Unfortunately, many students would leave the College before completing developmental course work, much less college-credit course work, and thus lose opportunities to enhance their lives both academically and socio-economically. Taking on this issue as an institutional priority, the FSCJ piloted math approaches, improved professional development, and developed highly creative, interactive, and affordable courses. FSCJ's efforts have positively influenced student success and retention rates in the developmental education math program from 59% to 70%!

Santa Fe College

Santa Fe College's energy conservation efforts with solar thermal shines as it partners with local government to generate over \$35,000 annually for the college in the city's utility buy-back program. The initiative and resulting funds are used to develop other energy projects and allow students within the SFC's Building Construction Institute hands-on experience with state-of-the art technology.

MAP –Works' diagnostic, preventive and prescriptive components is significantly maximizing the persistence and graduation of the targeted students by achieving a 3 year average retention rate of 82% for participants.

The Practicum Culminating Simulation Experience Seminole State College of Florida

The Seminole State College Practicum Culminating Simulation Experience prepares nursing graduates for better prioritization, delegation, communication and conflict resolutions skills upon entering the workforce. By including simulation in every course of the nursing curriculum, Seminole's faculty and clinical partners are training nursing students to master the competencies needed to be successful in this high demand career. Nursing faculty members and area hospital educators and administrators have worked collaboratively to truly merge theory with practice throughout the curriculum resulting in Seminole State College of Florida the honor of being chosen as the host school for the 2011 International Nursing Association for Simulation and Clinical Learning Convention.

ARE YOU A VOTING DELEGATE?

AFC is your Association. Conference delegates representing their chapter have the opportunity to elect state officers on Friday, October 28, 2011 from 7:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. It is important that each chapter's delegates are actively involved in guiding the direction of the Association.

So, how do you know if you are a delegate?

Each chapter president selects delegates to represent the chapter during the Assembly of Delegates for bylaws changes and voting of new officers. Your chapter president will let you know if you have been selected as a delegate. Once your chapter has selected its delegates, an official list will be sent to the state office and this designation will be noted on your registration. When you pick up your name badge at convention, delegate will be listed by your name. Your badge should be used as identification while voting on Friday October 28 at 7:30 am Acacia 1-3.

How many delegates does a chapter have?

This number is based on a one-to ten ratio, i.e. one delegate per 10 (ten) paid members.

What if I need to change a delegate once we are at convention?

Changes can be made at our Credentials desk in the registration area (PreConvene). Have your chapter president see Bobbi Moran or Alice Pendergrass at the Credentials desk and they will be happy to assist you in filling out the appropriate paperwork to make this change. These forms can only be signed by the chapter president.

The most important part of being a delegate is to be present. You must be present on Friday, October 28 to vote. Remember voting begins at 7:30 am and runs until 9:30 am. Make sure your chapter's voice is heard. Make sure you VOTE!

ATTENTION DELEGATES:

Voting for officers will take place on Friday, October 28, 2011 from 7:30AM - 9:30AM in Acacia 1-3.

Each delegate must bring his or her namebadge to be eligible to vote.

Student Development Commission Presents: Leadership Competencies of Community College Senior Student Affairs Officers

A total of 308 community college senior student affairs officers responded to The Community College Senior Student Affairs Officer: Demographics and Leadership Survey. Findings reveal that: (a) overall, community college senior student affairs officers rated the leadership skills identified by the AACC Competencies as important or very important; (b) community college senior student affairs officers rated their preparedness for the AACC Competencies significantly lower than they rated the leadership skills' importance; (c) earning an EdD and participating in mentoring relationships as a protégé both played a significant role in helping community college senior student affairs officers feel more prepared for the senior-level position; (d) participating in leadership development programs did not result in community college senior student affairs officers reporting a significantly higher level of preparedness for the AACC Competencies; and (e) institutional characteristics had a minimal impact on community college senior student affairs officers' perceptions of the importance of the AACC Competencies.

AGAINST THE ODDS AWARD

MARIA CARDENAS, EDISON STATE COLLEGE

"I haven't read about poverty, I've lived it. I've been there."

—Maria Cardenas



Maria Cardenas grew up in poverty. Both her parents were migrant farm workers who spoke no English and traveled the country, following the crops. Her days were filled with backbreaking labor, hunger, bug bites, snakes, sickness, drunken men cursing and fighting, and constant travel. During her tenth grade year, Maria married and moved from Florida to Oklahoma. She endured years of abuse before fleeing the marriage. In spite of growing up in a life of poverty, abuse and shame - and ultimately having to drop out of school in 10th grade - Maria never gave up her dream of becoming a College graduate. Although education was devalued in her culture, Maria taught herself to read and eventually passed the GED exam. College placement tests scored Maria at the seventh grade level.

In the Fall of 1994, Maria enrolled in classes at Edison State College (then Edison Community College). Through Edison's DLA (Developmental Learning Assistance) program and a Project HOPE (Help One Person Excel) scholarship, Maria began to experience academic success. Her grades were outstanding. She was honored with membership in Phi Theta Kappa (national honor society for community colleges), and the International Key Club.

During her time at Edison, at the urging of a faculty member who took a particular interest in her, Maria submitted an essay to a scholarship competition sponsored by Townsend Press. On the theme "Taking Charge of My Life," the review committee found the essay to be extraordinary and published her essay in a book called Everyday Heroes (1996). The book remains in print today and the publisher reports that they still receive letters from women and men who want them to know how inspiring they have found Maria's story.

With help and encouragement from her teachers, Maria graduated with an Associate in Arts degree - with honors – from Edison Community College and transferred to Florida Gulf Coast University, where she earned a Bachelor of Arts in Elementary Education, with a Florida State Endorsement to teach English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL).

While Maria's life was getting on track, she was dealt yet another blow. Years before, due to poor living conditions, she had contracted Hepatitis C. Her family's poverty and low social status meant she received no healthcare. Severe cirrhosis of the liver developed, requiring a liver transplant. There were many times she was expected to die, but ultimately she received the transplant.

Today, Maria teaches third graders who know little if any English. Many come from impoverished backgrounds and struggle to find faith in themselves. Yet, inspired by their teacher's example, each one yearns for a college education and a better life. "I tell them about how I grew up, and that I know what they're experiencing," she says. "I haven't read about poverty, I've lived it. I've been there."

HOMETOWN HERO AWARD

MICHELLE PICCIONE, ST. PETERSBURG COLLEGE

Michelle Piccione grew up with a severe math phobia. But with the help of her St. Petersburg College math instructors, she regained her self-confidence and went on to excel, earning an AA degree and then going on to the University of South Florida, where she earned a bachelor's degree in Zoology.

SPC changed her life.

While at SPC as an adult student, Michelle became active in the college's Honor Society and Student Government Association. She served as a tutor and note-taker for students with disabilities, and gave tuition and book money to students in financial need. She started a food service in the campus courtyard, providing lunches for faculty and students alike.

Her attention to the needs of her campus community earned her the Bob Graham Community College Service award and SPC's Apollo Award in 1993.

As an Apollo recipient, Michelle joined the Alumni Board. In 2008, during one of her terms as Board President, she discovered that two student help programs, Women on the Way and Male Outreach, needed financial assistance. She opened a thrift store as a fund raising project. Knowing the college could not assume liability for the project, she funded it—and directed it—herself. She has never taken a paycheck.

She formed the Dollars for Scholars of St. Petersburg chapter under the national organization, Scholarship America, and obtained non-profit status. SPC provided a building for the store, and Michelle used her own money to purchase fixtures and shelving. She canvassed the community in search of thousands of donated items. She passed out fliers, picked up donations, spoke at meetings, and talked to as many people as possible about the thrift store and what it could do for the community.

The Grand Opening in June 2009 was a huge success. Since then, Michelle has raised more than \$200,000, providing jobs for high school and SPC students as well as AARP seniors. The store gives textbooks to students who simply present their IDs; new student EMS/Paramedic and Nursing uniforms are sold at just above cost.

The thrift store project had the following objectives:

- To expand access to higher education for residents of Pinellas County
- To generate funds for student scholarships and awards
- To create jobs and mentoring opportunities for students

SPC Federal Work Study students, Pinellas County high school students, Florida Bright Futures Scholarship students, WOW and MOI students, Business Technologies Internship students and National Honor Society students learn retail and customer service skills by working at the thrift store. High school students who volunteer can use their work experience on their resumes.

Michelle Piccione resumed her education at St. Petersburg College more than 25 years after she left high school without a diploma. Since then, she has overcome her math phobia to successfully run several businesses and to complete AA and BS degrees. More important, she has put her education to work in the community, passing on her success to many young people who benefit greatly from her help.

Michelle Piccione grew up with a fear of math, but St. Petersburg College changed her life.



LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

DR. DAVID ANDREWS, PENSACOLA STATE COLLEGE

David Andrews always knew what he wanted to dohelp children.



David Andrews always knew what he wanted to do—help children. Yet, upon graduating from Booker T. Washington High School the Pensacola native wasn't certain what career would be most fulfilling or which might have the greatest impact on children. He enrolled in Pensacola State College (then PJC) as a first generation freshman in 1974 and immediately found a path.

Dr. Andrews' first semester introductory psychology instructor specialized in developmental psychology. An average student with less than average motivation, he suddenly became wholly inspired by the realization that it was possible to spend an entire career advancing society's knowledge of childhood and using that knowledge for the betterment of all children. He was especially intrigued by his instructor's focus on high risk children who faced substantial challenges in developing their full potential. That first semester on the campus of Pensacola State College he dedicated his career to working with, and for, high risk children.

Dr. Andrews graduated from Pensacola Junior College with an Associate of Liberal Arts degree prepared to seek more advanced degrees from Auburn University, Kansas State University, and Florida State University. By the age of 26 he held a doctorate and was an assistant professor at Oregon State University, well on his way to a highly successful career in academia.

Dr. Andrews' multiple positions as professor and eventually as the dean of two very highly respected schools of education (Ohio State University and Johns Hopkins University) have provided him with the opportunity to develop and evaluate scores of programs designed to enhance the lives of children. He's conducted and published influential research, built high impact programs in schools both domestically and abroad, and trained hundreds of teachers and early childhood professionals. Throughout his career he has secured over \$10 million in public and private support of his work with high risk children.

He serves as a regular consultant for major organizations and his advice has influenced the thinking of professionals ranging from senior leaders in the Department of Defense focusing on the needs of military families and their children, to the producers of the highly acclaimed Sesame Street.

Dr. Andrews is currently Dean and Professor in the School of Education and Professor of Public Health at Johns Hopkins University. In addition to his academic responsibilities he's building a state-of-the-art "campus" serving children from infancy through the eighth grade in one of the most economically distressed neighborhoods in Baltimore, and perhaps the country.

Dr. Andrews has been recognized with awards as a distinguished faculty member at Oregon State University and Ohio State University, and as a distinguished alumna of Florida State University where he received his PhD. Among Dr. Andrews' most prized recognitions is the Champion of Children Award for his work on behalf of high risk children in Ohio. He is most proud to be called a champion of children and will spend the remainder of his career justifying the title.

Dr. Andrews proudly considers his foundational experience at Pensacola State College as instrumental to his success.

Jodi Johnson is a decorated graduate of State College of Florida, Manatee-Sarasota (SCF).
