58th Annual Convention: A Stellar End to a Striking Year for Community Colleges

In a year marked with change and growth for the Community College System—from budget cuts, to lawsuits to a new governor to a new Commissioner of Education—more than 450 FACC members from across the state gathered to attend the 58th annual FACC Convention, Nov. 14-16, at the Wyndham Orlando Resort to “Elevate the Great 28.”

Presided over by 2007 FACC President, Jeffrey Allbritten (EC), this year’s convention was a non-stop activity-packed event including commission and region meetings, educational sessions, social events, an exhibit hall, and of course, recognizing and honoring our stellar alumni and hard-working college personnel. Additionally, networking, sharing ideas and collaborating with colleagues from around the state was an invaluable asset.

This year marked the return of the LeRoy Collins Distinguished Alumni Awards at the Presidential Banquet and Gala on Thursday, Nov. 15, and FCAA presented its annual Hall of Fame Awards at the Closing Luncheon on Nov. 16. Regions and Commissions also presented exemplary practices and awards (see listing on pages 3 and 5), and several FACC members were honored with Honorary Life and Distinguished Service recognitions.

Regions once again contributed to the success of the convention by staffing and planning many convention tasks. This convention would not be possible without the hard work of region directors and their committees—thank you. Thanks also are due to our sponsors and exhibitors (see listing to the right) whose contributions help make our Convention happen.

Florida community college enrollments up dramatically

Florida community colleges, long ranked as a national leader in degrees produced, have experienced an increase of more than 50,000 new students this school year in what has been described as a boom of “historic proportions.” The dramatic rise in numbers is attributed to the reduction in statewide funding passed by Florida’s Legislature earlier this year, but also to

the stellar service provided by the colleges over time and the tremendous reputation they have developed.

As evidence, Community College Week reported that four Florida community colleges rank in the top five in the country in producing graduates with associate degrees. Of the top 100 in the U.S. on that list, 15 of Florida community colleges appear.

There is also evidence that community college enrollments increase when the economy becomes more difficult. During these times, students seek out these institutions, graduate, find jobs and then help the economy recover. Community colleges have long been a tremendous source of revenue for the government to provide governmental services. It can be said that a healthy Community College System is vital to Florida's success, both economically and for the vitality of the business sector.



staff to your activities and events. Invite your College President to meet with members to discuss FACC and the Legislative Session (pre or post) or new college initiatives. Remember – your College President is an FACC member too!

IRCC Trustees vote to change college's name

The Indian River Community College District Board of Trustees has taken historic action, unanimously voting to change IRCC's name to Indian River College. The Board's action was inspired by strong student, business, and community response to the nine new bachelor's degree programs being launched by the College in January 2008. These high-demand baccalaureate degree programs focusing on teacher education, nursing, organizational management, public safety, and health care management were approved unanimously by the State Board of Education in February. In June, the College gained accreditation as a baccalaureate degree-granting institution by the prestigious Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). The name change reflects IRCC's expanded program offerings at the baccalaureate level.

IRCC has a history of outstanding accreditation reviews from SACS, the nationally recognized regional accrediting body for higher education in the 11 Southern states. The accreditation of the College's bachelor's degree programs continues this tradition of excellence, confirming that IRCC has the appropriate faculty, curriculum, facilities, student support services, library resources, and technology to provide high-quality baccalaureate education.

The name change will be submitted for legislative approval in Spring 2008, and will become official pending the Governor's approval. The College anticipates that it will begin phasing in the new name during the summer of 2008.

Bachelor's Degree Information Sessions will be held October 9, 10 and 11 at the College's five Treasure Coast Campuses to provide complete information on all aspects of the programs, including application procedures and program requirements.
